

COUNCIL MEETING OF SEPTEMBER 7, 1965

The regular monthly council meeting for September was called to order by Mayor Bryan. Councilman Meyer was absent. All other members were present.

The minutes of the August 17 and the special meeting of August 28 were read and approved.

The representative of the Kansas Power and Light Co. was present and submitted a franchise for the council members to consider. As the city attorney had already studied the contract he recommended that the council accept it.

The K. P. & L. representative informed the council that law required that the ordinance be read three times, and published four (4) times at least 7 days before the next meeting, at which time it would be read for the third time and become effective.

Council Meeting of September 7, 1965

Meeting was called to order by Mayor Bryan, Councilman Meyer was absent. All other members were present.

The minutes of August 17 and 28, 1965 were read and approved. New business was introduced.

Negotiation with the Kansas Power and Light Company began. City Attorney recommend the adoption of the franchises offered by the KPL.

The Ordinance must be read twice tonight and published four times at least seven days before the next meeting. And the third reading at the next meeting at which it would be effective. Present figures are as follows: \$1.50 11-200 Watts, 10-189 Watts at \$2.20. Projected figures are: 3% of gross revenue, \$1140 per year paid monthly at \$95 a month. Present street lights are \$38 a month. The KPL would assist the city with street lighting.

Minutes of reading of Ordinance No. 6 ^{will be} given to the City Clerk, *showing approval of Ord. #6 on 1st Reading, and approved on 2nd reading on emergency material.* Ordinance No. 7 granting to the Greely Gas Company. The statute re-
quired three separate readings and publications. Councilman Eberth moved the Ordinance No. 7 be read for the first time Councilman Worley second, it passed unanimously. Ordinance No. 7 was read and approved unanimously.

Councilman Meints moved an emergency be declared and Ordinance No. 7 be read for the second time, Councilman Worley second it passed. Ordinance No. 7 was read for the second time and approved by a vote of unanimous.

Mr. Loman brought up the question of the accident to Mr. Swope and Mr. Loman sons. Mr. Murray stated a compliant could be served yet. The ^{Police} ~~city~~ court could not determine civil suit. The next time changes are made in the State Highway signs the council will have to decide.

The City Attorney briefed the council on the application that was turned down. Mr. Mussett submitted two contracts signed prior to the effective date of Ordinance No. 4.

The City Attorney then advised the council could either accept the application or file police action.

There was a discussion of the possibility of moving a house into the Petherbridge Addition would be prohibited by ^{restrictions in} the abstract but no definite proof could be provided. *The city attorney stated that no city money involved in this case.*

The City Attorney stated that they council could authorize a permit if the required frontage from the adjoining lot with the understanding that it could be withdrawn if extra footage was purchased. However the applicant would not get another permit on the remaining property unless additional ground was obtained. The City Council couldn't okay the application as is, but would give reasonable time to apply for a new permit.

On the matter of driving stakes and laying out the house if it constitutes beginning of construction. The City Attorney stated probably not Mr. Mussett stated he would add a room in the basement and add the required land as shown on the drawing attached to the application. The council stated a permit could be granted on condition if a furnished room was added.

Councilman Eberth, moved the council approve the application as proposed. No second motion died.

No action was taken on Mr. Mussett's application no penalty would be assigned until final action on the matter. Councilman Askew suggested the councilmen look at the house to reach an opinion.

Councilman Askew moved the meeting be ajorned, Meints second, it was passed unanimously.
