

CITY OF BASEHOR
Council Meeting
Nov. 4, 1969

Present: Mayor A. Meyer, Councilmen F. Roberts, R. Raines, B. Eberth, R. Van Tuyl, and L. Worley.

Others present: C. Newman, City Clerk, R. Warden, City Treasurer, J. Murray, City Attorney, B. Browne, Engineer, C. Swope, Police Chief, Members of New Hope Baptist Church, and bidders on Phase 2 of the sewer project.

Minutes of the previous meetings of Oct. 7 and Oct. 21, 1969 were read and approved.

The treasurer's report was read by R. Warden. F. Roberts moved, seconded by R. Van Tuyl, that the report be accepted. Motion carried.

A report of the Police Judge, Wm. Franklin, was received and ordered filed.

Mayor Meyer opened for discussion the question of the repair of the police radio personally owned by C. Swope and used in his car for law enforcement purposes. A repair service policy may be obtained at the rate of \$5.50 per month. F. Roberts moved, seconded by B. Eberth, that the City of Basehor reimburse the Police Chief for the payment of the service policy to cover the radio now in use. Payment to begin Nov. 1, 1969. Five votes yes; no votes opposed. Motion carried.

The question of the use of chemical mace by the Police Chief was discussed. It was the opinion of the City Council that the Police Chief should have all protective means at his disposal and thereby agreed to purchase the chemical mace.

Mayor Meyer informed the City Council that Mr. Chuck Millsap is requesting permission to move a piece of heavy equipment (drag line) through the City about Nov. 15. Since the county had granted permission for the equipment to be moved over the blacktop roads, the City Council had no objections; however, it was suggested that the equipment not be moved through town during rush hour nor at a time when it would interfere with the sewer construction.

B. Eberth discussed putting a half round culvert in the street at a point east of the south entrance to the grade school. The City Council agreed to authorize B. Eberth to see that the project is completed.

Mayor A. Meyer reported to the City Council that the oiling of streets has been halted because of cold weather and no work will be started again until next summer.

During the discussion of streets it was pointed out that all culverts on an individual's property must be purchased and placed at the property owner's expense.

Permission was granted by the City Council for the Basehor High School to perform work on a culvert retaining wall. Expense was to be assumed by the school.

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The bids on Phase 2 of the sewer project were opened at 8:00 p.m. and the results were as follows:

Bruce Browne, Engineer, stated that he would make an analysis of the bids to determine if cuts may be made. Providing that the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration will approve the adjustments, Browne felt that the project would be in good shape and could come within limits. Bids are in effect for a period of 45 days.

B. Browne was directed by the City Council to negotiate with the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration for adjustments in the Phase 2 construction.

The B. E. Hunt Construction Co., being the apparent low bidder, is in line for the contract providing the adjustment can be made to come within the limits of the available funds.

Members of the New Hope Baptist Church were asked by the City Council to explain the violation of their building permit #56 for the construction of their church. The delegation stated they had no intent to violate the permit but were thinking in terms of future expansion and the ground needed to carry out such a program.

F. Roberts moved, seconded by R. Van Tuyl, that building permit #56 issued to the New Hope Baptist Church be amended to show that the building be set back 45 feet from the front property line instead of the 65 feet as shown on the original application for permit. Five votes yes; no votes opposed. Motion carried.

The joint regional planning agreement was discussed briefly; however, no action was taken to adopt the agreement and the concensus was to "wait and see."

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.
